## CBA LPRC POSITION REQUEST FORM

The CBA Family Law Section Law position request is as follows:

- 1. Proposed legislative or regulatory concept: The Section opposes legislation that permits the judiciary to amend statutes to allow the judiciary to remove testimony regarding family laws matters and relying instead on the use of affidavits.
- 2. Explanation and rationale for advancing this position: These changes take away the ability of people to cross-examine witnesses which is a time-honored way to obtain the truth. The unintended consequences of these changes will be to allow individuals being bullied or abused by one spouse to be unprotected by the court and will relegate some members of the public to become second class citizens. This position is imperative to protect the rights of all of the public.
- 3. Is draft regulation, legislation or proposed bill included? The proposed bill is HB-0605. Specifically sections 11, 17, 18, 19, 20, 21, 22, 23, 24, 35, 36, and 37.
